STEEL CHALLENGE VS. ACTION COWBOY SHOOTING

This is the second in a series of three articles comparing the similarities and differences between Steel Challenge and Cowboy Action Shooting

Start Position

Steel For centerfire handguns, the shooter will start with the gun loaded and holstered with wrists above sThoulders. For rimfire handguns or rifles there is no holster and shooter will start aiming at a flag or Low Ready position

Cowboy The starting position is included in the stage description. It could be any of several different possibilities. Typical starting positions are hands on gun leather (holsters) or hands on hat or shotgun in hand but not loaded. Others are hands hovering over but not touching the rifle or hands at full surrender (hands above the shoulder). There are others.

Divisions or categories

Steel

Centerfire Pistol Divisions

Open (OPN) - Any legal pistol, optics allowed Limited (LTD) - USPSA Limited pistol, iron sights only Production (PROD) - USPSA Production pistol, iron sights only Single Stack (SS) - USPSA Single Stack pistol, iron sights only Open Service Revolver (OSR) - Any legal revolver, optics allowed Limited Service Revolver (ISR) - Any legal revolver, iron sights only

Rimfire Divisions

Open Pistol (RFPO) - Any .22LR pistol, optics allowed Limited Pistol (RFPI) - Any .22LR pistol, iron sights only Open Rifle (RFRO) - Any .22LR rifle, optics allowed Limited Rifle (RFRI) - Any .22LR rifle, iron sights only

Pistol Caliber Carbine

Open Carbine (PCCO) - Any Pistol Caliber Carbine, optics allowed Limited Carbine (PCCL) - Any Pistol Caliber Carbine, iron sights only

No rifle calibers are permitted

Cowboy

There are numerous categories based on age, shooting style or type of firearm used. All



firearms must be of the type that one thinks of when considering the "old west" i.e: single action revolvers, lever action or pump action rifles, lever action or pump action or side by side shotguns. There are also categories for dress style. There are separate categories for men and for women. All firearms must be in a caliber that was typical of those found in the "old west".

SPORTING CLAYS


Preparations for the Sporting Clays program for Spring continue apace, with improvements being made to the course, replenishment of our stock of clays, and a league beginning this month!

RANGE RULE HIGHLIGHT

This month, we would like to highlight General Policies & Procedures Rule number 5, which may be found on page three of the printed range rules, and Violations and Enforcement Rule number 4, which is found on page five. Both rules may be found here, on our Club's website.

Rule 5 states: "All members and guests must sign in and sign out for all range usage. Guests must sign in and have signed the "Release" agreement and have paid the current range usage fee before any shooting activity."

Rule 4 states that "An 'Incident Report' must be completed in the event of accidents, incidents, or unsafe conditions by all members and guests present."

These rules together help engender a culture of accountability for the safe operation of our Club, with the goal of providing a place for enjoyable firearms and archery outings for everyone.

We welcome everyone to our Club, so they may enjoy what we enjoy, and these rules are there to help us to continue to do so. Without a culture of accountability for the safe operation of the Club, we would not be able to continue to thrive, or even exist.

So please, help us keep a good record of everyone who uses the Club, and any occurrence that would be considered unsafe, or a violation of the Club rules. It is especially important in the case of some accident, or incident that everyone involved assumes personal responsibility, by filling out and submitting a report of the accident or incident. It will always be appreciated by the Club, and will undoubtedly help in the resolution of any problems that may arise from such accidents or incidents.

Remember, *anyone* may call a "cease-fire" at any range, when they see someone with a problem, or acting in an unsafe manner.

So please remember the basic firearm safety rules, and if you have any questions regarding the range rules, please contact any member of the Club Board, or staff. Contacts can be found on the FLSC webpage.

MEDICAL RESPONSE TRAINING RETURNS TO FLSC!

As in the previous two years at Fenton Lakes, we will again be offering medical response training at FLSC. Single evening courses in trauma care (Stop The Bleed) and cardiac intervention (CPR) will be offered at no cost to members. Details will be forthcoming on those classes, with expected course dates late in May or early in June... e-mail notice for sign-up will follow at a slightly later date.

More immediately than the classes listed above, FLSC is again partnering with the National Ski Patrol to offer club members the opportunity to take EMT-level coursework in First Aid response. Unlike our one-day offerings cited above, this class is a college-level course with multiple weekly hands-on sessions; this year's offering of Outdoor Emergency Care will start at FLSC beginning May 15, and will run through approximately beginning of October.

Those who choose to enroll will be exposed to multiple elements of first-responder care, encompassing trauma response, medical emergencies and rural interventions, amongst many other topics.

While the course instruction for this class is provided free of charge, please understand that there are other costs that factor into this sizeable commitment, including certification, supplies, and equipment needs, all totaling approximately \$250 per student. Those who choose to participate should expect a rigorous and demanding class, that will yield personal readiness to handle most medical/trauma emergencies as a first responder.

Over the last two years, seven FLSC trainers, officers and club members have taken this coursework, all to great advantage to the club and themselves. OUTDOOR EMERGENCY CLASS DETAILS: OUTDOOR EMERGENCY CARE COURSE BEGINS MAY 15 AT FLSC, DETAILS FROM LEAD INSTRUCTOR MIKE WIGGINS:

As you are considering the Outdoor Emergency Care (OEC) class this summer, I wanted to provide you with relevant details so you can make a final decision.

Since this is a long email, here's a summary:

• Great first aid course, but challenging.

- Lots of talented instructors.
- Online kickoff meeting 5/15/24.
- We will meet in person every Wednesday from 5/22 to 10/2 from 6p to 9p for hands-on practice.
- Bookwork is online.
- There are some costs involved (see below).
- We are as flexible as possible with schedules.
- Our goal is to do whatever we can to help you succeed.
- Please contact me with any questions or to let me know if you intend to join us.

I'm Mike Wiggins and will be the lead instructor for the course. I have been in Ski Patrol for approximately 10 years and an OEC instructor for most of that time. I'm also an EMT. I have helped with several classes like this, and this will be my third time as lead. We have had great success with our prior classes, and we expect this year to be just as much fun. We have a great cadre of very talented and experienced instructors backing me up.

This course will be challenging, especially if it has been a few years since you've been in school. The material covers Basic Life Support (BLS) first aid on par with an EMT class. It covers, among other things, administrative and legal aspects of first aid, anatomy and physiology, disease processes, different types of trauma, and what to do about it. It's a lot of material to digest but is very doable. You will hear me say many times that our goal is to do whatever we can to help you succeed. You just need to put in the work.

There are several parts to the course:

- 1. Online bookwork this part is intended to be on your own, but there will be opportunities in and outside of class for discussions to make sure it all makes sense. There are weekly reading assignments, quizzes, and a few other exercises you'll have to complete.
- 2. Hands-on skills this will be the focus of our in-person sessions. This covers the process used to assess a patient and all the skills needed to treat different conditions, including potentially saving a life.
- 3. Testing The class will culminate in testing, which is comprised of a written, multiple-choice exam, scenarios in which you assess and treat a patient, and several skills. Don't worry, you will be well prepared by then.

We will start on 05/15/2024 with an online kick-off meeting. In person training will begin on 05/22/2024. We will meet every Wednesday from 6p to 9p. The final is tentatively scheduled for 10/02/2024. The date of the final may be adjusted depending on how ready we think you are and the availability of the army of people needed to run the test.

Everyone has other commitments, including the instructors. We are as flexible as possible with everyone's schedule. We will work with everyone to make up any missed material. If you think you'll miss more than two or three classes, please let me know.

As mentioned above, there will also be opportunities to dive deeper into the book material. We will spend a few minutes at the beginning of each class answering questions for each week's reading assignment. We also schedule online meeting sessions as needed to focus on some of the more important material from the book. I am a big believer that more knowledge (within reason) makes you a better practitioner.

The estimated costs for the course are as follows:

- OEC v6 text book, including online course access code \$93.71
- NSP Course Fee \$60.00
- NSP Dues \$96.00 (if you're already a member, then you've already paid this)
- CPR Materials \$30
- First Aid Supplies \$60

We are actively working on reducing or eliminating the cost of the first aid supplies through donations. We will let you know.

Please let me know in the near future if you decide to join us. I will need to order books before the class starts and send you sign-up instructions. Some of you have already indicated your intent to join us, so I will be sending sign-up instructions later today.

LEGAL NOTES

Our Club's reason for being is the support of the outdoor sports of hunting, with firearms, and bows; and given that an integral feature of that is the ownership and use of firearms, and we are distinctly an *American* sportsman's club, it follows that the right to keep and bear arms and to self-defense via the use of those arms are vital to that purpose.

So in support of our Club's efforts, this column offers information, news and commentary relevant to the state of the law in Michigan, as it relates to the right to keep and bear arms

While it would be inappropriate, and even sanctionable, for this author to offer advice as to any particular course of action without the appropriate attorney and client relationship, as the old saying goes, shared knowledge is king. Thus, please consider the foregoing.

This month, a court case will be discussed.

The case is a criminal case from the United States Middle District Court of Florida, in Tampa. The case is entitled United States v. Emmanuel Ayala.

In 2022, Mr. Ayala was a semi-truck driver for the U.S. Postal Service. Mr. Ayala, held a valid Concealed Pistol License, and normally carried a Smith & Wesson 9mm autoloader in a fanny pack, for self-defense. Current Federal law prohibits the possession of a firearm on Federal property, regardless of a permit to carry, with the exception of the parking lot.

In September of that year, while walking from the employee parking lot, through the USPS distribution center, to his truck, two USPS Inspector General agents tried to stop Mr. Ayala, but he fled, and was apprehended later. He was subsequently charged with possession of a firearm on Federal property, and resisting an officer, by a Federal grand jury.

Prior to trial, Mr. Ayala's court-appointed Federal Defenders brought a motion to dismiss the charges, on the grounds that the Federal prohibition against knowingly bringing a firearm onto Federal property was unconstitutional, in light of New York State Rifle & Pistol Association, Inc., et al. v. Bruen, and the principal that a U.S. citizen has a right to resist an unlawful arrest.

After considering argument from both sides, the Honorable Kathryn Kimball Mizelle, in an order with extensive argument, held that the United States could not prohibit the possession of a firearm on Federal property except for specific areas such as a legislature when the body was in session, and polling places, on election days.

The judge also noted that such a law amounted to a nullification of the Second Amendment, since the Federal government owns 28% of the United States, and would cover such things as toll booths, and Social Security offices.

Unfortunately for Mr. Ayala, Judge Mizelle did not dismiss the charge of resisting an officer, because that would require more facts than she had to that point in the case.

This ruling by a U.S. trial court does not affect Federal law, and indeed, the USPS has stated that their policy remains. It is, however an extensive, and well-reasoned argument for the principle that such blanket prohibitions do run afoul of the U.S. Constitution's Second Amendment, and it could be used as persuasive material in defense of a similar prosecution.

There will be more discussion and information in future newsletters, so in the meantime, keep your head on a swivel, <u>don't talk to the police</u> without an attorney, and have fun at our Club!
